Prayer as Holy Resistance—A Summary

- Spiritual evil requires spiritual warfare in prayer
- Our impulse to fight should be exercised in prayer
- We have the ability to resist evil influences and the powers that seek to exploit weaknesses
- A delayed response to our prayers could be the result of a number of different unseen factors
- The aim of our prayers is to bring heaven to earth, to call down the Kingdom in the present evil age
- Persistent resistance through prayer changes things

Presuppositions That Impact Prayer Life

Our view on the following will impact our view of prayer:

- 1. Nature of time & the universe (e.g. determinism or free will / blueprint theology or warfare worldview—real battle of wills)
- 2. God's sovereignty, character & image (e.g. Zeus / Cosmic Santa Claus or "Abba" Father / Jesus— "image of the invisible God")
- 3. God's foreknowledge (e.g. all is settled & final or future is to some degree open—God sees possibilities, we actualize reality/future)

The Prayer Life of Jesus

- Prayed alone... (Lk 5:16) in the morning (Mk 1:35); in the evening (Matt 14:23); all night long (Lk 6:12)
- Prayed with/for his disciples (Lk 6:12; Lk 22:32; Jn 17:1-26)
- Prayed for his enemies (Matt 5:44; Lk 6:28; 23:34)
- Prayed against Satan & rebuked him (Matt 4:10; 16:23)
- Prayed in all situations & moods (Lk 22:41-44; Jn 11:41-42; 12:27-28)
- Taught his disciples how to pray (Matt 6:9-13; Lk 11:1-4)

Jesus, Matthew 6:9-13 NLT

Pray like this:

Our Father [Abba] in heaven, may your name be kept holy. May your Kingdom come soon. May your will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us today the food we need, and forgive us our sins, as we have forgiven those who sin against us. And don't let us yield to temptation, but rescue us from the evil one [Satan].

"The Lord's Prayer, therefore, stands as the capstone of Jesus' prayer life shared with us. For this reason, when we pattern our prayer after his, our prayer becomes an eschatological activity. Just as the petition "Your kingdom come..." formed the heart of Jesus' praying, so also in every situation the petitions of Jesus' friends ought to be a cry for the in-breaking of God's rulership, God's will, into our world."

⁷ Now Moses used to take a tent and pitch it outside the camp some distance away, calling it the "tent of meeting." Anyone inquiring of the LORD would go to the tent of meeting outside the camp. ⁸ And whenever Moses went out to the tent, all the people rose and stood at the entrances to their tents, watching Moses until he entered the tent. 9 As Moses went into the tent, the pillar of cloud would come down and stay at the entrance, while the LORD spoke with Moses. 10 Whenever the people saw the pillar of cloud standing at the entrance to the tent, they all stood and worshiped, each at the entrance to their tent. 11 The LORD would speak to Moses face to face, as one speaks to a friend.

¹⁴ But their minds were made dull, for to this day the same veil remains when the old covenant is read. Prayer in Imagination—A Summary

- Our presuppositions and our picture of God impacts our prayer life
- Jesus calls us to see prayer as aligning with the Father's will and joining with God in actualizing the future of the Kingdom
- Prayer is for all situations, concerns, and moods we experience
- Imagination guided by the Spirit & Scripture is our main receptor to the spiritual world—the avenue of the mind that accesses spiritual realities
- Prayer in imagination is about moving from abstract, theological concepts to experiencing God concretely with "real" vivid images
